Vincentian Family Leaders Gather in Paris

Sister Mary Ann Daly, Federation Director and Sister Caroljean Willie, NGO Representative at the United Nations, represented the North American Federation of the Sisters of Charity at the international gathering of the heads of the Vincentian Family in Paris, France from January 28-31, 2010.

Two new members to the Family this year gave a report on the activities of their congregations. The Brothers of Charity were created 200 years ago in the city of Ghent, Belgium. Their primary ministry is to care for those who are mentally ill. In addition to the work they do in Europe, they have created psychiatric centers throughout the African continent.

The Sisters of Charity of Our



Lady Mother of Mercy were founded in the Netherlands in 1832. They are engaged in multiple ministries including teaching, care of the sick and elderly. Today they minister throughout Europe, in the United States, Surinam, Indonesia, Brazil and the Philippines.

Each branch of the family was invited to give a presentation on dynamic and creative apostolates. Sister Mary Ann highlighted the Maritime Project of the four Canadian members of the Federation and the new House of Charity

in New Orleans for our report.

Father Manuel Ginete gave a review of the activities planned in celebration of the 350th Anniversary of the deaths of Vincent and Louise.

A report was given by Father Maloney on the systemic change workshops held in Mexico, Brazil, Cameroon and Thailand.

Sisters Focus on Social Development at the UN

What does it feel like to be left out? For the world's majority, social exclusion arises from poverty, discrimination, injustice, violence and climate change. "Social Integration" or inclusion was the theme of the 48th UN Commission for Social Development.

This February, during the second of a two-year process, the Commission focused on social development advances and challenges in 46 UN member states. Delegates noted that the world's social safety net was weakened by the global financial crisis as

well as food and energy crises.

About 80% of the world's people lack social guarantees that would allow them to deal with life's economic and social risks.

Sister Ann Moyalan, attended the Commission on the Status of Women at the UN and is currently serving as an intern in our NGO office.

Ann is a registered nurse and midwife, holds a post basic BSC Nursing Degree from Chandigarh University, India and has been working with Dalits, tribal people at the grass roots level in India for 28 years. She also served as a community health organizer in Belize, Central America, for two years.

At present she is working with a Muslim community in one of the slums in Delhi, India. This group of people has migrated from throughout India to Delhi looking for a livelihood. Most of them live in poverty and live in a single room in one of the most crowed areas under the worst hygienic conditions. Every member of the family including the children has to work very hard to meet basic needs.

The status and the condition of women/girls and children in the community is one of great vulnerability. Ann works for the empowerment and integrated development of women, children and the society through education, skill training, Self Help Groups, awareness programs, youth groups, CBOs (Community Based Organization) and Net Working.

She and other members of the Sisters of Charity of Nazareth have organized and empowered thousands of women and adolescent girls. In order to keep a balance and to involve the whole community in (cont'd on p. 3)

54th Commission on the Status of Women

The Commission on the Status of Women was held at UN Headquarters in New York from March 1-12, 2010. The Commission undertook a 15 year review of the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action and the outcomes of the twenty-third special session of the General Assembly.

Emphasis was placed on the sharing of experiences and good practices, with a view to overcoming remaining obstacles

and new challenges, including those related to the Millennium Development Goals. Member States, representatives of non-governmental organizations, and of UN entities participated.

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Social Development at the UN cont'd

Many Commission delegates focused on vulnerable women and children, youth, seniors and family concerns, as well as indigenous and disabled persons. Many also emphasized the need for a "social protection floor." This refers to a UN initiative promoting universal access to life's basic necessities and essential services, including food, water, housing, health care and education.

Federation participants at the Commission included: Srs. Caroljean Willie, SC, Faith Colligan, DC, Janet McLaughlin, SC, Irène Leger, SCND, Marion Sheridan, CSM, Roma De Robertis, SCIC and Julie Cutter, DC.

Sr. Julie said that she appreciated international participation in, and insights arising from NGO side events such as a workshop that explored links among climate change, poverty and inclusion cosponsored by the SC Federation.

Sr. Marion commented that "Sometimes we religious and members of other NGO faith groups think we're not important, but this experience showed the importance of our joint advocacy efforts."

Sr. Irène speaking on the Civil Society Forum commented that it was "an opportunity to hear about cases of extreme social exclusion, and how through programs - mostly sponsored by

NGOs— excluded persons were able to be empowered".

Sr. Roma concluded by saying that "I respect and admire the cooperative work of UN NGOs and am happy about the leadership role played by Catholic women and men religious..."

the transformation among women, the youth and the men also are included in the educational and empowerment programs.

Some Women, having recognized their strength and the ability to be leaders, like catalysts, have become agents of structural and systemic change in their own society.

By organizing women in the villages, creating awareness among the public,

Administration, Judiciary, and by net working with other NGOs, they were able to get Legislation passed in Parliament against Witch Hunting and to control Witch Hunting in West. Singhbhum, Jharkhand, India.

Ann is especially interested in the work at the UN around the issues of women and interreligious dialogue.

She is attending committee meetings and learning the role of an NGO at the UN.

She has networked with other religious NGOs from India and is exploring ways of connecting Religious throughout India to collaborate in the work of the NGOs at the UN in New York.
