

### Look Back or Look Forward?

he turn of the year is a time of retrospectives. What were the top newsworthy events? Who were the most influential people? What were the best movies, songs, books? It might be helpful to look at your life in a similar way. Turn the pages of your journal back to January 2013 and read the entries. Are you amazed or dismayed? Probably some of both ...

What were the big questions you were facing in 2013? Even if



the questions remain, you have a different perspective and new information now, 12 months later. It might be helpful to draw out a timeline of the year with peaks and valleys indicating times of clarity and confusion as well as the plateaus of "I'm tired of trying so hard to figure this out!" What did you hope to know by now?

Maybe it seems that many questions still remain. But before you beat yourself (and God) up for being a slacker in discernment, acknowledge what you have learned and the way the Spirit has indeed moved you along the spiral path of knowing your heart's desire. Just because you still have questions doesn't mean that you are no closer to the answers. Whatever time you gave to prayer and reflection was not wasted on God. Every opening you gave to the Spirit was used to your advantage whether you knew it or not. Looking back, are you surprised by what you know now or at decisions you have made?

Right now, in this moment, what questions are most pressing on your heart? Write them down. Give them expression somehow. Get some colored pencils and draw them in a mandala. Find a song or poem or Scripture passage to honor them. Be creative. As the poet Rilke says, "Learn to love the questions."

Now face forward. What feelings stir in you as you begin 2014? Look especially for the glimmers of excitement, wonder, joy, energy. Where do you sense possibility that draws you forward in hope? These are indicators of the great adventure that God's call holds for you. Who are the people that help you to live into those glimmers? What projects, actions, or explorations give perspective to those possibilities in your life? Commit yourself to make those connections as you live into this New Year.

Back in 1962, my first mission slip read "Carroll High School." Off I went to Dayton in August with a new diploma in my hand and much trepidation in my

heart. S. Eugene Fox greeted me with a warm welcome and carefully introduced me to all the Sisters in the convent. The adjustment went smoothly – until we met the principal, Fr. Victor Ries. He gave me my schedule for a sophomore boys homeroom, two classes of all boys, and three classes of all girls. Not knowing where to begin, and seeing the bewildered look on my face, S. Eugene came to my rescue and immediately began giving me help with my first real lesson plans.

Every week S. Eugene would explain what literature would be good to teach, help me with a good way to teach it, and how long to spend on each lesson. Periodically, she would meet with me and another new English teacher to teach us how to help students learn to write in a more organized and creative way.

S. Eugene's kindness reflected her deep love of God and her strong desire to serve Him through her students and young teachers. In my early teaching years, I wanted to be just like her. I thank God for allowing this great SC to help fashion my teaching career and my life.
